Library of Things Program Evaluation Resources

The purpose of these questions is to provide a starting point for library professionals interested in surveying their community for a potential or existing LoT collection. This document is not intended to provide a comprehensive, all-inclusive list of questions that may be relevant to ask during the community needs assessment, but rather a jumpstart to your evaluation. Many of these questions were sourced or adapted from Cuyahoga County Public Library's internal Adult Program Evaluation, <u>Miami Public Library's Public Needs Assessment</u>, <u>Oak Park Public Library's Community Needs Assessment</u>, and <u>HUD'S Community Needs Assessment</u>. The latter three assessments are publically available and are fantastic resources. Oak Park's assessment offers great examples on verbiage to introduce questions and conclude your survey.

Please feel free to download a copy of this document, and explore the appended resources, to further revise and inform your own community needs assessment, using your own community- or library-specific context and information.

Program evaluation typically involves the following steps:

- 1. Defining program goals and objectives: The first step in program evaluation is to define the goals and objectives of the program. This provides a clear framework for evaluation and helps to ensure that evaluation activities are aligned with program priorities.
- 2. Identifying evaluation questions: The next step is to identify the evaluation questions that need to be answered. These questions should be focused on assessing program effectiveness, efficiency, and impact.
- 3. Developing an evaluation plan: Once the evaluation questions have been identified, an evaluation plan is developed. This plan outlines the data collection methods, analysis techniques, and reporting formats that will be used in the evaluation.
- 4. Collecting data: Data is collected using a variety of methods, such as surveys, interviews, focus groups, and document reviews. The data collected should be relevant, reliable, and valid.
- 5. Analyzing data: The data collected is analyzed to determine the extent to which the program has achieved its intended goals and objectives. This analysis may involve statistical techniques, such as regression analysis or cost-benefit analysis.
- 6. Reporting findings: The findings of the evaluation are reported to program managers and stakeholders. The report should provide clear and concise information on program effectiveness, efficiency, and impact, and should include recommendations for program improvement.

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Program Evaluation Prompts

- Consider your library's strategic plan. How does or would your LoT fulfill any aspects of this plan?
- What do you already know about your community's needs and values? What resources do they have access to via other social services, businesses, or entities in your community?
 - How can you best reach your community to survey their needs? Do you have the bandwidth and ability to distribute multiple surveys in multiple modes (e.g. email to all patrons, physical mail to all residents, short questionnaire after checkout, public comment, including a survey with LoT items)?
 - Are you seeking to bring new patrons into the library? Are you looking to increase usage of library resources by current patrons? Are you hoping to increase your number of physical visits by patrons?
- What are your collection goals? For example, are you prioritizing collection size growth, spatial capacity, or diversity?
- How will you evaluate the effectiveness of your LoT? Does your library have existing evaluation plans? If not, or you want to revise it, what are the markers for success for your library?
 - Having a plan helps ensure that future evaluations are feasible and instructive. Putting the plan in writing helps ensure that the process is transparent and that all stakeholders agree on the goals of both the program and the evaluation. It serves as a reference when questions arise about priorities, supports requests for program and evaluation funding, and informs new staff. An evaluation plan also can help stakeholders develop a realistic timeline for when the program will (or should) be ready for evaluation.
